

(ATTORNEY MARKMAN/GENERAL MANAGER THOMPSON II)

Staff has placed this item on the agenda for consideration so that the Association can continue to meet virtually pursuant to AB 361's special Brown Act requirements for teleconference meetings. These special requirements give local public agencies greater flexibility to conduct teleconference meetings when there is a declared state of emergency and either social distancing is mandated or recommended, or an inperson meeting would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Commissioners make the following findings so that meetings of the Association will be subject to the special Brown Act requirements for teleconference meetings: (1) the Association has reconsidered the circumstances of the COVID-19 state of emergency; and (2) state and local officials continue to recommend measures to promote social distancing.

Alternative Options:

The Commissioners can choose not to approve Resolution No. 2022-1.

Impact of Taking No Action:

Teleconference options for the Association's publicly noticed meetings will end.

Background:

On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom proclaimed a state of emergency to exist in California due to the spread of COVID-19. The Governor subsequently issued numerous executive orders suspending or modifying state laws to facilitate the response to the emergency. Among other things, these executive orders superseded certain Brown Act requirements and established special rules to give local public agencies greater flexibility to conduct teleconference meetings. Those special rules expired on September 30, 2021.

On September 16, 2021, in anticipation of then-imminent expiration of his special rules for teleconference meetings, the Governor signed AB 361. In key part, this bill amends the Brown Act to establish special requirements for teleconference meetings if a legislative body of a local public agency holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency and either state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or the body determines, by majority vote, whether as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

To continue to hold meetings under special teleconferencing requirements, a legislative body of a local public agency need to make two findings pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(e)(3). First, there must be a declared state of emergency and the legislative body must find that it has "reconsidered" the circumstances of such emergency. Second, the legislative body must find that such emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the legislative body's members to meet in person. Alternatively, for the second finding, the legislative body must find that state or local officials continue to impose or recommend social distancing measures. These findings must be made within 30 days after the legislative body teleconferences for the first time under AB 361 and on a monthly basis thereafter.

The declared emergency is still in effect. Furthermore, the State of California and local officials have recommended measures to promote social distancing. The California Division of Occupational Safety and Health still requires that employers provide training on the effectiveness of physical distancing in the workplace.

Budget:

There is no budget impact.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE ANTELOPE VALLEY STATE WATER CONTRACTORS ASSOCIATION AUTHORIZING PUBLIC MEETINGS TO BE HELD VIA TELECONFERENCING PURSUANT TO GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 54953(e) AND MAKING FINDINGS AND DETERMINATIONS REGARDING THE SAME

WHEREAS, the Commission is committed to public access and participation in its meetings while balancing the need to conduct public meetings in a manner that reduces the likelihood of exposure to COVID-19 and to support physical distancing during the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of the Commission are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 – 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the Commission conduct its business; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Assembly Bill 361, signed by Governor Newsom and effective on September 16, 2021, legislative bodies of local agencies may hold public meetings via teleconferencing pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(e), without complying with the requirements of Government Code Section 54953(b)(3), if the legislative body complies with certain enumerated requirements in any of the following circumstances:

- The legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency, and state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing.
- 2. The legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency for the purpose of determining, by majority vote, whether as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

3. The legislative body holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency and has determined, by majority vote, that, as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom declared a State of Emergency in response to the COVID-19 pandemic (the "Emergency"); and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention continue to advise that COVID-19 spreads more easily indoors than outdoors and that people are more likely to be exposed to COVID-19 when they are closer than 6 feet apart from others for longer periods of time; and

WHEREAS, due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the need to promote social distancing to reduce the likelihood of exposure to COVID-19, the Commission intends to hold public meetings via teleconferencing pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(e).

NOW, THEREFORE, this Commission resolves as follows:

Section 1. The Recitals provided above are true and correct and are hereby incorporated by reference.

Section 2. This Commission hereby determines that, as a result of the Emergency, meeting in person presents imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

Section 3. This Commission shall conduct its meetings pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(e).

Section 4. Staff is hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Section 5. The Association has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency and finds that: (i) the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person, and (ii) state or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the board authorizes staff to release and distribute the fees received from the Antelope Valley Watermaster (Watermaster) in accordance with the approved Replacement Water Plan.

Background:

The Association and the Watermaster entered into an agreement dated October 23, 2019 for the purpose of recharging the Antelope Valley Groundwater Basin with imported water and assisting the Watermaster in fullfilling its replacement water objectives. In accordance with this agreement, the Watermaster submitted a request for 1,058.06 acre-feet of replacement water in exchange for the corresponding Replacement Water Assessment (RWA) fees totaling \$482,808.71. Association staff worked with staff from the three member agencies to draft a plan for supplying the replacement water to the Watermaster. This Plan was submitted to and approved by the Watermaster Engineer. The Watermaster Board accepted the Plan at their meeting held on January 26, 2022.

The approved Plan assigns the replacement water obligation and subsequent funds from RWA fees collected to the agency within which the overpumping occurred. Replacement water obligations and funds for RWA fees resulting from over pumping outside of the Association agencies' boundaries is divided amongst the agencies in proportion to their allocations of State Water Project Table A water. The attached Plan provides a breakdown of the replacement water provided, the storage locations it will be deducted from, and the funds from fees provided to the agencies in compensation.

¹The AF Assessed for Joshua Acres MWC was for a producer inside the AVSWCA service area. Joshua Acres MWC was recently determined to be outside this area and will be invoiced for the difference between the inside (\$415) and outside (\$888) rates.

Association staff has determined that the excess pumping has occurred primarily within the Antelope Valley East Kern Water Agency (AVEK) service area, with the small remainder occurring outside of the Association's agencies boundaries. The member agencies of the Association have agreed to supply replacement water for excess pumping per the Agreement between the Association and the Watermaster dated October 23, 2019. AVEK will be responsible for 1,037.18 acre-feet of replacement water for excess pumping that occurred in its service area. The remaining 20.88 acre-feet of excess pumping outside of the Association's service area will be split as follows: AVEK 17.95 acre-feet, Palmdale Water District (PWD) 2.64 acre-feet and Littlerock Creek Irrigation District (LCID) 0.29 acre-feet. It is the recommendation of the respective agencies that the replacement water be deducted from previously stored imported water. AVEK has requested that the Watermaster deduct the full 1,055.13 acre-feet from its Westside Water Bank and both PWD and LCID have requested that their portions be deducted from water stored at the State Water Project Recharge site.

Upon Board approval of this plan, summarized in the table below, the Association and its represented agencies authorize the Watermaster Engineer to make the recommended deductions.



Report Items:

• Antelope Valley Water Master Meetings

- Staff provided a presentation to the Watermaster Board and Advisory Committee regarding State Water Project reliability projection based on AVEK's and PWD's Urban Water Management Plans.
- The Watermaster Board authorized a letter sent to the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors expressing concern over water theft and contamination in the Antelope Valley Groundwater Basin in association with illegal cannabis grows. It further requested that they continue to allocate funds and support to law enforcement to combat the illegal grow operations and consequent water theft.
- The Watermaster Board approved continuation of engineering services with Todd Groundwater through 2024.
- The Watermaster's attorney has sent final warning letters to parties that are noncompliant with the Judgment and/or delinquent in their payments.
- Watermaster administrative staff is working on an RFP for third party administrative services.

• Replacement Water Plan & Assessment Rate for 2022

 Staff utilized the methodology developed by Raftelis and approved by the Association for determining the Association's Replacement Water Assessment Rate for 2022. The Association service area rate was set at \$523.00 an acre-foot and the outside Association service area rate was set at \$1,055.00 an acre-foot. These rates were adopted by the Watermaster Board at their January 26th meeting.

• Big Rock Creek Joint Groundwater Recharge Project Feasibility Study

• Staff is coordinating a meeting for early February with Kennedy-Jenks Consultants to coordinate tasks and timelines for completing the Project's feasibility assessment.

• Antelope Valley and Fremont Basin IRWMP Stakeholder Meetings

- Staff worked with Woodard and Curran to assist the Antelope Valley Resource Conservation District in receiving advanced Prop. 1 grant funding.
- Staff is working on an amendment to the AVIRWM MOU for grant administration support by Woodard and Curran for the recent Urban and Multi-benefit Drought Relief Disadvantaged Community Involvement and the Proposition 1 Round 2 IRWM Grant Program.
- Staff worked with Woodard and Curran to complete the first quarterly Prop. 1 IRWM report submission to the Department of Water Resources.

• Mutual Response Agreement for Antelope Valley Agencies

- Staff utilized feedback from representatives of various Antelope Valley mutual water companies to develop amendment language for the Antelope Valley Mutual Response Agreement that would help smaller agencies participate in the Agreement. The amendment was reviewed at the AV Mutual Response meeting on January 18th and was well received.
- The participants of the Agreement will be meeting in early April to establish their administrative committee and begin the process of selecting an administrator for the Mutual Response Group.

• Antelope Valley Home Show and Smart Water Expo

• Staff has been informed that the AV Fair will no longer be hosting a Home Show. They are currently planning a replacement event. Due to this, they have returned the \$10,000.00 that the Association previously paid to sponsor and participate in the next Home Show.

Recommendation:

Antelope Valley Watermaster Administrative staff recommends the Board Approve Resolution No. R-22-01, which sets the following Replacement Water Assessment Rates for producers inside and outside of the Antelope Valley State Water Contractors Association (AVSWCA) boundaries:

Calendar Year	Inside AVSWCA Boundaries	Outside AVSWCA Boundaries
2022	\$523/Ac-Ft.	\$1,055/Ac-Ft.

The proposed rates will be assessed to each acre foot of a Party's Production for which a Replacement Water Assessment has been imposed in calendar year 2022. This amount is collected and passed through to the imported water supplier(s) which agrees to provide the replacement water to the groundwater basin via recharge or release of previously banked imported water. One item the Watermaster should consider is adding a fee to the amounts above, which would recover Watermaster staff time and expenses associated with implementing the replacement water program.

The Antelope Valley Watermaster Board previously approved Resolutions, which set the following Replacement Water Assessment Rates:

Background:

The Antelope Valley Watermaster is compelled by the court to require groundwater pumpers to replace water in the Antelope Valley Groundwater Basin when they have pumped over their adjudicated right. The AVSWCA member agencies will be a primary source for providing this replacement water due to their collective ability to import water and recharge the basin. To this end, AVSWCA contracted with Raftelis to determine a rate structure that included replacement costs for pumpers both inside and outside of the AVSWCA collective service area. This is important as those pumpers within our service area have helped pay the fixed costs of the State Water Project (SWP) through their property taxes while those outside have not. The cost for replacement water to be charged to pumpers is based on cost to deliver raw water plus an additional 10% to capture the loss of water expected when recharging the imported water supply into the groundwater basin. Pumpers outside of our service areas will pay this rate plus a charge to cover their proportional share of SWP fixed costs.

Utilizing the same methodology used in prior years, staff updated the financial model developed by Raftelis for AVSWCA to update the Proposed Assessment Rates for 2022. This financial model is updated on an annual basis to account for changes in the annual fixed costs and deliveries as updated in the Department of Water Resources' annual Bulletin 132 and changes to the AVEK's untreated water delivery charge.


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
